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#### June Coffee Morning Report – The Ice Man

The scene so vividly set by Andrew Thompson was a bare rocky landscape high in the Alps. In 1991 a German couple descending from 10,000 feet noticed a brown patch on the ice and found a mummified body. Aghast, they reported their find to Austrian police. And that initiated prolonged efforts to hack the preserved remains out of the ice. With the discovery of an axe, the case was filed as murder! I t was only on day 6 after the discovery that the first archaeologist went to examine the body, pronouncing it to be several thousand years old.

Andrew is passionate and knowledgeable about 'Ötzi', whose story still excites archaeologists today, as increasingly sophisticated technology continues to uncover 'new' evidence.
